### **LUTHERANS AND THE REFORMATION**

"Luther himself has no desire to be Lutheran except insofar as he teaches the Holy Scriptures in purity." - Martin Luther

This year we mark the quincentennial of the distribution of the "Disruption on the Power of Indulgences," or to say it plainly, the 500th anniversary of the posting of the 95 Theses by Martin Luther. If there is any one single issue that sets Confessing Lutheran Christians apart from the rest of Christendom it is this—the unflinching confession of the authority of scriptures.

It was the plain word of scriptures that drove an Augustinian monk and University academic to stand against the nearly uncounterable power of the Roman Church. It was the clear teaching of scriptures that drove many to support Luther in the clear confession that our salvation is won by the merit of Christ alone, that this merit is granted to us freely because of God's love and mercy, and that our works, though they might be ever so good, gain us nothing in the merit and favor of God.

It is this understanding, that the words of the prophets and apostles are trustworthy because they testify to Christ and his Kingdom by the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, that has brought people together in confessing Lutheran churches for 500 years now.


does it even mean to be called a "Lutheran" anyway?

While there are many who call themselves Lutheran who have abandoned scriptures, we continue to go by this first pejorative name of "Lutheran." I could think of a thousand names I would rather be called than "Lutheran," if I am honest. Maybe we could call ourselves the "Church of Concord" because we all confess the exposition of scriptures found in the Book of Concord. There

are other titles available—maybe they would be helpful and maybe they would just further confuse. What

If to be called a Lutheran means that we lift Luther up above other men, then we should abandon this name. If being called Lutheran is only a term of historical interest, then this name means nothing. If to be a Lutheran means that we confess the same Lordship of Christ and the grace of the Father revealed to the world in the life, death, resurrection, ascension, and promise to return, that has always been confessed from the days of the apostles to this very day, then we are in good company. If it means that we look to no other besides Jesus Christ and his cross for our hope and salvation, then let us continue to be called Lutheran. If this is what it means to be Lutheran, then the whole of the Church of Jesus Christ is the "Lutheran" church.

So whatever we are called, let us continue to do one thing; let us continue to have faith in Christ. Let us continue to trust the testimony of the Holy Spirit as written by the prophets and apostles as they bear witness to the love of God found in Jesus Christ. Let us continue to share with the world the lavish forgiveness of sins given freely for the sake of the Son of God and his promise that all those who look to him will be raised to everlasting life and salvation on the day of his return.



# THE PASTOR'S CORNER

In the past week, Hurricane Harvey devastated the shoreline of Texas. Speaking with pastors and friends in the area has left the impression that the devastation has left the region feeling more like a war zone than a home. They describe a situation to me that will take not just weeks and months to address but even years.

However, in the midst of this disaster, LCMS churches have already begun the work of providing care in the form of money, manpower, and items that are needed. This reminds me in some ways of how the early church addressed the needs of many during a famine that swept the region of Jerusalem. In 2nd Corinthians 8 and 9, St. Paul boasts in the generosity of the saints gathered in



Macedonia and spurs on the saints gathered in Corinth to emulate their actions. Though the Macedonian church was poor, they gave greatly, even beyond their capacity.

In the midst of a very severe trial, their overflowing joy and their extreme poverty welled up in rich generosity. For I testify that they gave as much as they were able, and even beyond their ability. Entirely on their own, they urgently pleaded with us for the privilege of sharing in this service to the Lord's people. And they exceeded our expectations: They gave themselves first of all to the Lord, and then by the will of God also to us.

#### 2 Corinthians 8:2-5

It has always been the way of the church to support those who are in need, especially those of our brothers and sisters in Christ as they work to share the Gospel of God's love in Jesus in word and deed. It has always been the way of Christ and his church to live a cruciform life, to live sacrificially for the other.

In light of this, it is my prayer and hope that we at Grace will answer the needs of the saints in Houston by supporting localized LCMS efforts with our time, talents, and treasures. In the days ahead, let us be mindful to the fellowship we share in the love of Christ and the ways our love for neighbors expresses itself in action and prayer.
